TOWN OF EAST LYME POLICE COMMISSION REGULAR MEETING OF JANUARY 11, 2018 **MINUTES**

MEMBERS PRESENT: Mark Nickerson, Daniel Price, Thomas Gardner, Joseph Perkins, Mark Powers and Tony Buglione. Giancarlo D'Angelo arrived at 6:28 p.m. Mr. Nickerson left at 6:50

Also in Attendance: Police Chief Mike Finkelstein

Mr. Price called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. Delegations

Fredicka Gunther, 123 Pennsylvania Avenue, Niantic, and Gail Sanjuan, 16 Joanne Street, Niantic, spoke in favor of agenda item #6a to put a crosswalk at the intersection of Joanne Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, citing safety concerns because there are no sidewalks in that area; and it is noted that it is the only side street in that area without a crosswalk.

4. Approval of Minutes - Regular Meeting of November 9, 2017 MOTION (1)

Motion by Mr. Nickerson to approve the regular meeting minutes of November 9, 2017. Seconded by Mr. Gardner. Motion passed 6-0.

6. New Business

Receive information and take possible action regarding a crosswalk request for Joanne

Street and Pennsylvania Avenue.

DISCUSSION: Chief Finkelstein stated that he understands completely the need for a crosswalk at this location, but explained that lack of money in the budget for this project is going to be the biggest hurdle. This was discussed and it is the understanding of the Chief that the State may approve the crosswalk but that they will not fund the project; the Town would need to come up with the money. Mr. Nickerson stated that it is not the Town's jurisdiction to make a decision on putting the actual cross walk in, but simply to endorse the possibility and direct the Public Works Director to send a letter to the State DOT. Since everyone is in agreement that it would be a good idea to put a crosswalk at that intersection, it was decided to move forward and see what the options are.

MOTION (2)

Motion by Mr. Buglione to support the possible installation of a crosswalk at the intersection of Joanne Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, and to direct the Public Works Director to send a letter of request to the State of Connecticut DOT.

Seconded by Mr. Gardner. Motion passed 6-0.

b. Receive information and take possible action regarding a request for no parking signs on Fairhaven Road.

DISCUSSION: Mr. Nickerson reported that Fairhaven Road is the road that connects and is used as a cut through from West Main Street to the Crescent Beach area. This situation has arisen because a homeowner on that road has been using the Town's right-of-way to park their large landscaping equipment, and it is causing dangerous sightline issues. Mr. Nickerson stated that this homeowner/business owner has been the subject of blight issues in the past. During this past storm, the plows had a difficult time maneuvering around the equipment. It is requested that no parking signs be put in on the Town piece of property to prevent non-Town equipment and vehicles from being parked there.

MOTION (3)

Motion by Mr. Gardner to approve the installation of parking signs on a piece of Town property on Fairhaven Road. The property will be surveyed by the Chief of Police and the Public Works Director, and the number of signs necessary and the locations of such signs will be determined and installed per their recommendation.

Seconded by Mr. Buglione. Motion passed 6-0.

- c. Update on upcoming Police Union negotiation process by First Selectman. DISCUSSION: Mr. Nickerson gave a brief summary of what the Commission members should expect from the contract negotiation process. He stated that the Commission should bring any questions/issues they might have to him, and he will in turn take it to negotiations if appropriate.
 - d. Discuss staff needs.

DISCUSSION: Mr. Gardner stated that he has done a risk threat assessment and is asking that the Commission approve two additional dispatchers plus an increase in police officers based on a staffing analysis based on population versus number of officers. Mr. Price noted that the upcoming budget proposal does include two additional dispatchers, and that we should hold off on adding officers until next budget cycle. Everyone agreed that adding officers would be good, and it was decided that doing a thorough analysis taking all factors into account should be done; Mr. Gardner agreed to put together that report for a future meeting.

7. Chief's Report

Chief Finkelstein gave a summary review of the December 2017 Monthly Report, which is attached hereto as Exhibit 1.

8. Chairman's Report

Mr. Price stated that the commission should set up a special meeting in the near future to begin budget discussions. After discussion, a special meeting will be scheduled for Wednesday, January 17th at 6pm in Conference Room 1 at Town Hall.

11. Public Comment

Jim Levandoski, East Lyme Police Department, stated that he would like the Police Commission to put the police pickup truck back in use for patrol. He stated that he performs tasks with the truck, which also serves as his office, that the cruisers cannot do; i.e., evidence transport and the transport of range equipment. Mr. Levandoski stated that all training for officers that is in the budget is mandatory and that the training budget cannot be cut.

Section 1: Noteworthy Incidents/Information

The East Lyme Police Department App & Tips411 are live and fully operational. This was covered by a pre rollout spot on NBC30, New London Day article on release and social media announcement. Will be working with Superintendent on increasing school awareness.

The Chief continues to meet regularly with the Superintendent of Schools to review and improve upon the relationship between our two organizations. This has included recent steps to streamline Officers access into schools in both emergent and non-emergent situations.

One of the two new East Lyme Police Cruisers is nearing completion at the PWD facility and should be on the road within a few weeks. The second will be undergoing equipment install immediately following the completion of the first. In December, one vehicle was involved in a minor car vs deer accident and is currently out of service while undergoing repair. Another unmarked SUV has also been removed from service. The PWD continues to work with a vehicle wholesaler to liquidate several of the Asset forfeiture vehicles.

The East Lyme Police light parade was held with great success. East Lyme Officers, along with Officers from 8 Southeastern Connecticut Police Departments, provided event security and traffic control.
