12. Water Project Updates

Well 1A and 6 Treatment Plant Modifications and Upgrades – Discussion and Possible Project Authorization for Construction Phase

Mr. Kargl noted that they had the project schedule information in their packets. He said that now that the new water rates have been adopted that Mr. Bragaw will look over the dollar issues so that they can discuss this project next month and potentially take action on it. He also further reviewed the reverse osmosis process noting that many of the usual items would also have to be removed regardless. He noted the project schedule in the \$4M to \$5M range.

Mr. Bragaw said that he wanted to review this in relation to the debt service and the impact that this would have on the rates over the next 10 years. He noted that while the micro-grid would represent a \$400,000 reduction and the potential for us to get it may be good due to having so many facilities in the one area — there are other factors to consider. He said that he will look into it further and come back with more information.

13. Correspondence Log

14. Chairman's Report

Mr. Seery reported that he and Mr. Bragaw had attended a meeting with the CT DOT regarding the Route 156 paving. It will begin this week Thursday during the day and the road will be open on alternate lanes. They estimate it will take 10 days and that there will be delays.

Mr. Bragaw said that due to the shim coat being so high that they will have to adjust all of their fixtures. The paving company has also damaged a few of our structures so we will bill back to the State to be reimbursed by the contractor that the State hired for the job. They will be paving over our manholes with the next 2" that they put down.

He also said that the Saunders Point paving is done with the touch-up being completed at this time

15. Assistant Utility Engineer Update

Mr. Bragaw said that they held interviews on October 17, 2018 and are still doing their due diligence.

Mr. Kargl noted that they received 10.99" of rain.

Ms. Russell responded that W&S also helps the Town. She gave as an example how use of the O/M Building historically has been shared with other Town departments, but W&S has paid 100% of the insurance, utility, and maintenance costs for the building.

Ms. Russell also pointed out that the low hydrant payments from the Town impacts what we can charge Montville and Waterford for fire hydrants installed along the regional interconnection.

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CONNECTICUT DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH SAFE DRINKING WATER PRIMACY ASSESSMENT FAQ

What is the Safe Drinking Water Primacy Assessment (SDWPA)?

• The SDWPA is a fee that is collected by the Department of Public Health (DPH) to support the department's ability to maintain primacy of the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act.

What is primacy?

Primacy is the responsibility to implement and enforce the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act.
 Since 1977, the DPH has been delegated primacy from the U.S. Environmental Protection
 Agency (US EPA).

What does the fee go toward?

- The fee goes toward funding existing staff that carry out critical functions of the Connecticut DPH Drinking Water Section. These include, but are not limited to:
 - Operating an enforcement program to ensure the public water systems comply with all safe drinking water requirements;
 - Maintaining an inventory of public water systems throughout the state;
 - Compiling a database to contain compliance information on public water systems;
 - Conducting sanitary surveys of public water systems;
 - Reviewing and approving public water system plans and specifications;
 - o Providing technical assistance to managers and operators of public water systems;
 - Enforcing public notification, ensuring that public water systems regularly inform their consumers about the quality of the water that they are providing;
 - Certifying laboratories that test drinking water samples;
 - Administering Connecticut's Drinking Water State Revolving Fund program, which provides low interest loans to public water systems for planning, design and construction projects;
 - Administering an Operator Certification, Backflow Prevention and Cross-Connection Program;
 - Public interaction with citizens, chief elected officials, school officials and local health directors including addressing consumer complaints and water quality concerns;
 - o Education of all entities regarding new requirements; and
 - Source water assessment and protection.

When and how would customers be billed?

- The fee amount is based upon system classification and number of service connections and comprises of the following for state fiscal year 2019 (July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019):
 - o All Non Transient Non Community Systems = \$125 annual fee
 - Community Water Systems (CWSs) with less than 50 service connections = \$125 annual
 fee

CONNECTICUT DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH SAFE DRINKING WATER PRIMACY ASSESSMENT FAQ

- CWSs with 50 to 99 service connections = \$150 annual fee
- CWSs with 100 or more service connections = \$2.57 per service connection (SFY '19)
- The fee is being invoiced by the DPH and due dates are set by system classification as follows:
 - o On or before October 1, 2018 DPH issues invoices to CWSs
 - On or before January 1, 2019 CWS payments are due (50%)
 - o On or before January 1, 2019 DPH issues invoices to NTNC systems
 - o On or before March 1, 2019 NTNC payments are due
 - o On or before May 31, 2019 CWS payments are due (remaining 50%)

Why are fees suddenly being charged to Public Water Systems?

Historically, the DPH Drinking Water Section had been primarily funded by the US EPA grant
funds. Approximately seven years ago the DPH prepared budget projections that showed a
downward trend in federal funding and began proposing a fee collection program to cover the
gap. Recently, the projections came to fruition and the legislature recognized the need to fund
the DPH Drinking Water Section through collection of fees by enacting Public Act 17-2 for the
year 2019.

What will happen in future years?

 The DPH is currently working with the Office of Policy and Management and water utility stakeholders to develop a methodology for future years.

Do other state drinking water programs charge fees?

Yes, many other states charge fees to support primacy. The DPH published a fee study in 2017.

 No. The SDWPA will cover approximately 21% of the costs required to fund the drinking water program.
