

Waterford-East Lyme Shellfish Commission Meeting Minutes Thursday November 15, 2018

- 1) The meeting was called to order at 7:41 pm and a quorum established by acting Chair J. Patrick Kelly. Peter Harris is delayed because of snowstorm traffic.
- 2) The agenda was modified by the Acting Chair to take the Dock Applications first:
 - a. Dock Application for 29 North Edgewood Road, Niantic was presented by Bob Conigliaro of Gerwick Mereen! After discussion a motion by Bowlen, seconded by Kanter to approved the application. 4 to 1 vote with Spakowski voted against the motion. Motion passed!

 - b. Dock Application for 46 Niantic River Rd., Waterford was presented by Bob Conigliaro of Gerwick Mereen! After discussion a motion by Kanter and seconded by Kelly to approved the the application. 2 to 4 voted with Kelly, Bowlen, Spakowski, Tytla voted against motion. Motion defeated.
 - c. Dock Application for 4 Bayside Ave., Waterford was presented by Keith Neilson of Docko, Inc.
 After discussion a motion was made by Kelly and seconded by Bowlen to approved application.
 3 to 3 vote with Titla, Spakowski, Kanter voting against the motion. Motion defeated.
- 3) The minutes of the October 18, 2018 meeting were reviewed. The minutes were accepted on a motion by Mr. Kelly, seconded by Mr. Spakowski; all in favor, motion passed.

The purpose is to review State Statues CHAPTER 492 LOCAL SHELLFISHERIES on Local Shellfish Commissions powers that are relevant to WELSCO's activities.

Mr. Harris,

I wish to commend you and the entire WELSCO commission on the fine work you have done over the past several years surrounding the aquiculture application. Your perseverance has been inspiring. On behalf of the citizens of East Lyme (and Waterford), I wish to thank you for your dedication and volunteerism, especially in the face of so much conflict.

In light of the increased attention this application has received, and the legal firestorm it is likely to produce, I asked our town attorney to research and weigh-in on your role in leasing areas in the Niantic River in order to protect your commission members and our town. As you are well aware, being a state agency has certainly made this situation more complicated than expected yet we find the enabling statute crystal clear.

The final judgment from our lawyer is that your commission should stay clear of leasing area in the Niantic River. His letter is attached. Once again, I thank you for your service to our towns and the fine work you have done to date.

Re: Waterford – East Lyme Shellfish Commission

Dear Mr. Nickerson:

You have requested our advice regarding the power of the Waterford – East Lyme Shellfish Commission ("WELSCO") to grant leases for the taking of shellfish from the waters of the Niantic River.

WELSCO's enabling statute, Conn. Gen. Stat. §26-287 provides, in pertinent part, that WELSCO may "license such taking [of shellfish] and, in connection therewith, adopt reasonable regulations and fix license and permit fees." Among the fundamental principles of statutory construction are that the legislature was aware of what it was doing when enacting a statute, that each word in the statute must be given effect, and that the statute cannot be interpreted to authorize an action which the statute does not expressly authorize. Applying these principles to WELSCO's enabling statute, it is noteworthy that the word "license" appears twice in the same sentence describing WELSCO's powers and the word "lease" appears nowhere in the statute. It is evident that the legislature was aware of what it was doing when it authorized only licenses, and not leases, because most statutes pertaining to shellfish commissions authorize these commissions to grant leases. Here, the absence of the word "lease" is significant, inasmuch as it differentiates WELSCO's power from the powers of most shellfish commissions.

There is a basic distinction between a license and a lease. A lease grants to the lessee the exclusive right to make use of a defined area for a specified period of time, and enables the lessee to exclude others from the leased premises. A license is more



in the nature of temporary permission to make use of a defined area, but usually does not grant exclusive use. Applying the principle that the powers of WELSCO are limited to actions which the statute expressly authorizes, it is our advice that WELSCO may grant licenses for the taking of shellfish, but may not grant leases for such purposes.
